A great day with good weather for a run to the (European) Birthplace of the Great Southern Land.

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

Restoration Tips by Colin Money







Removing and Replacing Door Trims and Handles.

Having the right tools will make the job easy.

I have made a door trim remover to do the job. I created the inner door handle remover using an old screw slotted driver by cutting a vee with a very thin blade in an angle grinder. Then, with the help of oxy torch, I bent the arm to a 150 degree angle for easier access and purchase on the handle spring retainer.

The door handle should be in an upright position as the clip you have to push on is on the right side. Slide screw driver between handle and plastic washer (if still installed) and locate the screwdriver groove on spring clip. Push the spring and, with the help of your other hand, pull the door handle towards you. It should come off its square peg with some maneuvering.

Replacement will not require this tool. You will just need to locate the handle on the square peg and maneuver back on until the spring clip engages in the slot at the end of the peg.

<u>Door trim</u> –Place the trim removal tool both sides of trim clip. The trim should come off without damage. (See two tool types).

For the seal between the door frame and door trim, use a good quality, heavy micron plastic.

Some people take the time to cut the plastic to size. Personally, I take a piece larger than the size required and put the glue on door frame. I then put the plastic on and cut off the excess with a Stanley knife. Remember to leave 30-40mm (about an inch and a half or so) so you can tuck it in the long slot at the bottom of the door to stop water getting into the trim and preventing the backing board from rotting away.

Refit the trim, handles and arm rests and top metal panel— job finished.


















Progress Report 1961 Plymouth Valiant Suburban Wagon

Lately, I have had a chance to get a little bit of work done on the wagon. I sort of consider time that I do get to work on it as my meditation. I can go to where it's stored and walk around it, look at it, see what the next step I need to do with it and slowly tinker away. Of course, I can spend hours doing one thing to it and it really doesn't look like much is done at all. Other times, I spend a short time doing something and it looks like a stack of stuff has been done.

The very typical, "I can't do one process until other items are done" popped its head up recently. An example is, when I wanted to finally finish off the cargo area at the rear of the wagon. This included the rear 3rd seat set up. So, to get the seats in, I needed to finish painting the metal base, but it's raining and the ambient air temperature wasn't right. So I have to wait a few days on that one.

The red side plastic trim covers needed a hole cut into them for the electric tailgate switch. I needed to install everything to line up with where the hole would go. There wasn't any margin for error, so this had to be done right. But before that could happen, I needed to install a mounting plate that the switch could fit into. But before that, I needed to make a mounting plate. But before that, I needed to find a piece of steel the same thickness as the metal on the inside of the wagon to match.

I found an old busted up battery tray and measured up the rough size of the hole. Marked it up on the flattest part of the tray. I drilled out all around the area I needed. Using my little 1/3 hp bench grinder, I ground the circular shape. I then measured out the size of the squarish hole in the middle for the electric tailgate cargo switch to fit into. I drilled it out and filed it out to the shape of the switch. I made sure the switch fitted in and then comes out and fitted back in. I find a lot of what I do is test fit everything, check, double check, triple check, look close, look from afar and then finally install it.

Then I found a way for the newly made plate to stay in the hole of the body of the wagon it will affix to, and still stay nice and flat for the plastic cargo trim to cover. I drilled three holes into the plate and then into the inside of the wagon body - I am good at that. The drill bit was slightly smaller than the screws that had to go in so using a small round file, I filed them out slightly larger. That was all good until I got to the last one and the tip of the file snapped inside the hole in the body of the wagon... So I went home. Don't let it beat you. Just take a break and come back calm, with fresh eyes.

Next time I was there it took a little while, but I got the snapped file tip out of the hole. Now I had it fully lined up and in place on the switch mounting plate. I put all items for the rear cargo area in place, so I could now line it all up to cut a hole into my perfectly good plastic cargo trim cover. No mistakes allowed. I lined it all up, drilled a small hole into the cargo cover and then started to cut a small hole from the middle of where the switch was going to go. Once that was done, it all came out of the wagon again and I measured a extra 3mm around the hole and cut more away. This was to give the sprung steel that holds the switch into place a little room so it doesn't mark the plastic. That being all done, I put the cargo covers back into place and it looked like I cut beyond the lower part of the switch and now a hole appears above the switch -ARRRH!! So again, I went home. Remember, don't let it beat you. Just take a break and come back with fresh eyes.


I arrived back at the wagon. I began bolting everything into place. The back of the 3rd seat, the metal lower cargo cover, and the plastic cargo covers, all the holding screws in place. Now magically all the holes line up. Nothing is out of place. The switch pops into place. No extra holes to be seen. Excellent! I am not going mad after all.

BUT !!! Before I can finish up and tick all this off, I have to make the wiring loom that goes from the rear door sill to the cargo switch and to the electric tailgate and the other wiring to the brakes and indicators. However, I decided I wanted to separate out the USA indicators which are located in the USA brake lights and put them into the USA Back up lights, which is the same as the Australian R Series indicator lights. But, since I am using a Q Series Instrument gauge facia which is using both left and right indicators this needed to be two wires.










Sounds easy but there was one other slight issue - I know nothing about auto electrical works. So, before any of that could happen, I needed to knowledge up in that area. I read stuff, I rang fellow club members who are proficient in this area, I got online and watched heaps of videos. I asked more questions and then I had a crack at making a rear loom. Then I got it checked by an auto electrician who was very surprised at my first go at this.

It was a little tricky getting the looms fed through the back of the wagon wheel arch area, but nothing a piece of flexible plastic and string couldn't handle. I did put in an extra wire cable, just in case I want to put a set of back up lights later, down the track.

So, with the rear electrics in place and the rear cargo tailgate switch in place, I could install the plastic cargo cover and the metal cargo covers and finally the 3rd seat setup was all in place. There are still a few minor things to go in that area that surely will take another week or two, but it's getting there.






























NSW R & S Valiant Club – Minutes – General Meeting – 1st May 2023

<u>Minutes 3/4/2023</u>: Minutes of the previous meeting recorded by Sue had been emailed to those present and were accepted on the motion of Col Money, seconded by Bob Nix.

<u>Editor's Report</u>: Colin K-L said he had started on the May-June magazine, but won't be able to finish it until next week. Waiting on Mike Barker to finish the ACD poster to go on page 2. Regrets the delay in members receiving this issue.

<u>CMC Report</u>: Michael said he had nothing to report as the next meeting will be held at the end of May. Col Money has 3 unallocated tickets for the Eastern Creek Display Day. This year tickets are \$25 each and the club purchased 20 tickets.

<u>ACD Report</u>: Colin K-L said there was nothing new to report. The advertising flyer being designed by Mike Barker will feature Australian and US muscle cars this year.
